## <u>"Planning Our Route" Day, Box Moor Trust,</u> Hemel Hempstead, Sat 12<sup>th</sup> March 2016

All decisions made on 12<sup>th</sup> March were recommendations to the Trustees. Agreement was recorded from a show of hands plus ballot paper votes. (*Full notes of the day have been circulated*).

# a) Are you in favour of Contemplative Fire Ltd transforming itself into a Charitable Incorporated Organisation?

### 58 in favour, none against.

It was noted that the Office of Civil Society still had to put a final piece of legislation in place for the Associate structure to be taken forward, led by Bob Wilson, MP for Reading East. Jack McBane has written to his MP Nick Clegg about this and suggested other Companions might do the same. CF North is happy to take this work forward.

## b) Are you in favour of maintaining the present Trefoil?

#### 58 in favour, none against.

It was said that appreciation of the Trefoil had been enhanced by the consultation, undergirding our community and many personal journeys.

d) Are you in favour of the revised Aims and Objects?

56 in favour, 1 against.

57 in favour, none against.



e) Are you in favour of the proposed new Responsibilities and Functions?

58 in favour, none against, 1 refer for further work.

### f) Issues that emerged during the Review

Leadership, Finances, CIO Registration, Website, Communications, Needs of Local Groups, Teal culture

Are you in favour of establishing Companions' Groups to help the trustees implement the proposals?

**29 in favour, none against, one abstention (no ballot papers).** Green forms were circulated for Companions to make an offer for 2016 with regard to the above (*sent by email*).

Tony Mealing writes:

Following the Saturday meeting I have been thinking - what is Contemplative Fire missing? What does it not have? Here I go back to principals - as a community, we are spread out and rather disjointed. For a "community" to function it needs members to hold hands and to communicate. You "might" do this at a higher level but that is not enough. Let us look back into the past, say Jesus came to town - where would he go first? The local pub, or a wedding, or a friend's house for a meal. What we are lacking is this level of socialising. This builds bonds between members, encourages prospective members to be invited and builds up commitment one to another and to the organisation. Do we do this? Might I make a suggestion? We invite each other into our homes, and not necessarily the members we would choose but, say, the ones we would not. I miss the retreats that Philip organised. These got us all together over a short period of time, but together.



On another tack, because I think to get together you need an end goal, looking at UK Pilgrim Walks, walkingworld.com, there are a number of one day pilgrim trails (or, if a bit too long, could be done by car) walked in three 10 mile stretches over three or four days:


"The Saints' Way stretches from Padstow (starting at St Petroc's church) to Fowey. The stunning 30-mile walk is well signed with Celtic cross markers. Cornwall Country Council (<u>www.cornwall.gov.uk</u>) provides a route guide. The website also gives details on St Michael's Way, another Cornish pilgrim route that makes for great walking."

### Still Waters at St Albans - "Connection"

Helen Fitch-Hunter writes: I facilitated a recent Still Waters at St Albans on the theme of "Connection".



I had been particularly moved by Linden and Stephen's Lenten Reflections in 2013 - I told them so at the time - which included a beautiful line drawing by Stephen of the Tree of Life. I used this evocative representation of Jesus on the Tree, tying it in with this St John Chrysostom quote:

"The tree is my eternal salvation. It is my nourishment and my banquet. Amidst its roots, I cast my own roots deep. Beneath its boughs I grow. Flying from the burning heat, I have set up my tent in its shadow and have found there a resting place, fresh with dew. I flower with its flowers. Its fruits bring perfect joy, fruits which have been preserved for me since time began, fruits which now I freely eat.

"This Tree is food, sweet food for my hunger and a fountain for my thirst; it is clothing for my nakedness; its leaves are the breath of life. If I fear God, this is my protection; if I stumble this is my staff; this is the prize for which I fight, the reward of my victory. This is my straight and narrow path; this is Jacob's ladder, where angels go up and down, and where the Lord himself stands at the top." A pendant that I recently acquired was a beautiful example of the connecting circle and perennial creation.



The design linked with the circularity of the Celtic cross. As John O'Donohue says, "The circle around the beams of the cross rescues the loneliness where the two lines of pain intersect and seems to calm and console their forsaken linearity."

The Trefoil was also used as an image to show the connecting flow in to all parts of life.

The verse we focused on was taken from The Message translation of Matthew 18: "When two or three of you are together because of me, you can be sure that I'll be there."

The music reflections used included a Taize form of "Ubi caritas et amor, Ubi caritas Deus ibi est", (Where charity and love are, God is there) and Philip Roderick's track "Weaving" from his hang drum CD "Sheer Sound".

The varied elements of the reflection each emphasised our interconnectedness.

Several people attending the group said they appreciated the connection and provision made by Contemplative Fire.



29<sup>th</sup> March is the anniversary of the birth of **RS Thomas,** poet and priest, vicar of Aberdaron for 11 years until 1978. Although retired from ministry 36 years ago, for some, the memory of him is still alive.

By chance, I was talking with a visitor on Sunday morning who remembers him. Now in her late 50's, the family have been coming to Aberdaron every year, for 40 years. She and her mother especially, used to love to hear him preach.

"He would stride through the village, in his long black cassock, tall and slim with that unmistakable unruly head of hair." *"I remember, he once gave a sermon on 'love and marriage', it made a great impression on me as a 16 year old girl!"*



## 'Hanging in God': The Blessed Jan van Ruusbroec, Theologian of the Mystery

Jan van Ruusbroec was a fourteenth-century Flemish mystic who described the spiritual ascent up to a state of 'hanging in the essence of God'. He also warned against the dangers of false mysticism that was prevalent in his times as it is in ours. The session will provide an opportunity to explore the current relevance of Ruusbroec's writings on the pathways and pitfalls of spiritual progress.
